I usually pass over the Daily U.S. Casualties report when I'm reading my morning newspaper. There are too many bad memories of the body counts during the Vietnam War, in that the reports tried to simplify, quantify, and justify the loss of so many young men. But this morning something compelled me to look at the list, and this is what I saw:

"Marine Sgt. Frank R. Zaehringer III, 23, of Reno, Nev., died Monday, Oct. 11, 2010, in combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 9th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C."

I can't ever remember seeing that unit designation in any kind of report or newspaper, and I was somewhat dumnstruck. After a few minutes I began to realize that Sgt. Zaehringer was a member of the very same, exact 2nd Battalion, 9th Marine Regiment to which so many of us were assigned in 1975, except for being part of the 2nd MarDiv instead of 3rd MarDiv. I thought about how sad his family and friends must feel, very much the same as those of our brothers lost on May 15, 1975. As I pondered more I thought how fortunate we are that these young men have stepped into our boots, and now carry the banner of 2/9 to a different clime and place. A different time, a different place, a different generation, yet the bloodshed is the same, and he too is our brother.

Condensed Minutes of Meeting Koh Tang / Mayaguez Veterans Organization 15 May 2010 Branson, Missouri

- Vice President Bob Blough opened the biannual meeting of the Koh Tang / Mayaguez Organization at 10:00 a.m. with 47 members present. He complimented and thanked Al and Tina Bailey for all the planning and work to make this reunion happen. A recommendation was made to form a committee to assist the Baileys in the continual search for participants in the Mayaguez recovery. No motion was made but several members agreed to assist in this endeavor.
- No minutes from the previous meeting (2008) were available. Fred Morris presented the treasurer's report and Bob Blough approved the report as read.
- Bob Blough outlined the topics of this meeting as: (1) Change the name of the organization to reflect the current membership; (2) Read, discuss, consider and approve the Constitution and By-Laws; (3) Elect new officers for the 2010-2012 term.
- Dan Hoffman motioned that the name of the organization be changed to "Koh Tang / Mayaguez Veterans Organization" (KTMVOrg) which was seconded by Fred Morris and carried by a vote of the membership.
- Fred Morris presented a draft copy of the Constitution and By-Laws for which each article was discussed and amended as necessary. The following is an outline of the Constitution and By-Laws: Mission Statement; Art. I Name & location; Art. II Purpose; Art. III Powers; Art. IV Membership; Art. V Meetings; Art. VI Board of Directors; Art. VIII Officers; and Art. VIII Amendments.
- Bob Blough concluded the discussion and certified that, with corrections, the Constitution and By-Laws was approved and adopted.
- The floor was opened for the nomination and election of officers for the 2010-2012 term with the following results: President Dan Hoffman, Vice President Dan Darden, Secretary Edd Prothro, Treasurer Fred Morris, and Board of Directors Bob Blough, Al Bailey, Vic Salinas, and Tom Noble.
- Bob Blough announced that a recommendation had been made to return to Branson in 2012 for the next reunion which was unanimously approved.

Hello My Brothers,

Much has happened since our big reunion in May. I was waiting to get final answers on some things before I sent this memo, but much is going on, so I will share what is happening now and follow up in the near future with more information.

First, the good news: Since the reunion I have spoken to more than 10 of our brothers who are now "in the door" with the VA and in the process of getting the Veterans Benefits they justly deserve. At least another half dozen of our guys who were getting some benefits are now receiving an increase in their disability benefits. As always, if I can assist you in the process of getting your VA benefits, call me anytime.

Author Scott Baron's new book, "Valor on Koh Tang Island and the Recovery of the Mayaguez," is set for publication this spring by the Naval Institute Press. Several of our brothers are major contributors to this book, which for the first time looks at our battle from the perspective of the Marines on the ground. It is very well written and shows us in a very favorable light. Details on the upcoming publication will be announced soon.

Work continues on the placement of the Captains Desk and Bunk from the SS Mayaguez. The National Museum of the Marine Corps in Quantico, VA, is in the initial stages of discussions. Hopefully, a display at the museum is in the works. If the museum does not go ahead with the exhibit, we will have a backup plan.

Have you checked out kohtang. org? (Not our site, kohtang.com.) It seems some Chinese investors want to turn our little island into a resort with condos and highways. Many of us are extremely concerned that those carrying out construction on Koh Tang might ignore any remains they uncover, especially those of our brothers who have not yet come home. JAPAC in Hawaii has been notified, I will keep you informed on this very sensitive issue.

Tom Noble is working hard on our 3rd Annual Golf Scramble (6 Aug 2011) which raises money for the Ronnie Hughes Fund. This is a weeklong campfire gathering. Check-out the flyers on the website for more information.

Finally, I'm pleased to announce that on November 6 we will be celebrating the Marine Birthday Ball at the Gregory S. Copenhaver Marine Corps League Detachment in Elkton, MD. The league is named after our brother Gregory S. Copenhaver, whose remains were repatriated in 1995 from the wreckage of Knife 31 on East Beach. Joining us at the Birthday Ball will be members of <u>L/Cpl Copenhaver's family</u>. We invite you to attend. 



PTSD Diagnoses to be Based on Veterans' Own Testimonies

VA hopes to implement a new rule by early 2010 that would make it easier for vets with PTSD to collect disability compensation. VFW says the ruling will help its service officers, too. by Tim Dyhouse

eterans diagnosed with posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) will find it easier to file VA disability claims. They will no longer be required to provide evidence—other than their own testimony—of an event that caused their PTSD.

VA published a proposal in the Aug. 24, 2009, Federal Register noting that it would no longer require "corroboration of a stressor" (the event or experience that caused the PTSD) if a VA psychiatrist or psychologist confirms that a veteran's stressful experience "adequately supports" a PTSD diagnosis and the vet's symptoms are related to the stressor.

VFW favors the proposal because it

"eases the evidentiary burden" on vets suffering from PTSD and the VFW service officers who help them.

"The change also will make VA's job a little easier because it won't have to do as much development to obtain evidence necessary to establish a service-related stressor," said Gerald T. Manar, deputy director for VFW's National

Veterans Service. "Our service officers won't have to help VA and the vet find records that prove a stressor. Service officers only need to be sure that VA properly understands the work and experiences vets had while serving."

But Manar doesn't necessarily agree with a VA representative's assessment that the new ruling would "allow us to pay benefits much faster" when VA's backlog of claims and appeals stands at some 1 million.

"By policy, VA works on its oldest cases first," said Manar, who worked at VA for 30 years. "As a consequence, anyone seeking service connection of PTSD under these proposed changes will still have to wait until 150,000 cases

that have been pending for more than six months are settled. What it may do is allow VA to move those six-monthand-older cases where stressor verification is an issue more quickly."

Doctors Must Provide Testimony

Before this new ruling, VA claims adjudicators were required to corroborate that non-combat veterans actually experienced a stressor related to hostile military activity. Now, combat support personnel in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars—as well as those of previous wars—who experience combat should find it easier to garner service-connected disability compensation.

"A physician must testify that the stressor which caused the PTSD is the stressor which occurred while in combat or as a POW."

Jerry Manar, deputy director,
 VFW National Veterans Service

"Supply convoys in Vietnam were frequently ambushed," Manar said. "But because those troops weren't classified as 'infantry' they weren't eligible for the Combat Infantryman Badge, and it was extremely difficult to prove they were in combat."

He says VA only recently began accepting unit records showing Vietnam War ambushes or records proving an individual was assigned to a unit that was ambushed. Manar advises vets who were denied a service-connected PTSD claim for lack of evidence to reapply.

"The proposed change eases the evidence burden, but it does not create any kind of presumption," he said. "If a Vietnam-era veteran claims, for

instance, that his stressor was received in combat in Vietnam and military records show he never went to Vietnam, then VA is free to deny the claim in spite of this change in regulations."

Manar points out that even vets who have received a medal for combat or valor, or were prisoners of war, must still obtain a doctor's supporting testimony.

"Simply being in combat or imprisonment is not sufficient to ease the evidence burden on a veteran," he said. "A physician must testify that the stressor which caused the PTSD is the stressor which occurred while in combat or as a POW."

Though the burden of proof on the veteran has eased, Manar doesn't believe the new ruling will open the door to "significant" numbers of fraudulent claims.

"Does that mean that some veterans will try to game the system?" he says. "Sure. But they will have to fool a doctor twice into believing that they have PTSD and that it is related to a stressor in service. Can that be done? Yes, but probably fewer times than you would think."

According to Manar, the main result of the new ruling will be that the collecting of evidence to prove a stressor "largely goes by the boards with this change." VFW doesn't believe, he says, that the change will open the floodgates of new or reopened claims for PTSD service connection. Rather, it could allow VA to operate more efficiently.

"The river of claims will grow deeper and flow quicker," he said. "VA will have to paddle more quickly to move against the current, but, since their boat is lighter thanks to this regulation change, they should be able to make progress upstream."
